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The Fourth Annual Statewide RIBN Conference

On Tuesday, March 17, 2015, 130 people gathered in Greensboro, North Carolina for the Fourth Annual Statewide RIBN Conference. The keynote address, *The Nursing Workforce: Navigating Through Transformative Health System Change*, was provided by Erin Fraher, PhD, MPP from the Cecil G. Sheps Center for Health Services Research at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill.

The address was followed by a thought-provoking panel considering nursing's role and preparation for the future. The panel included responses by Warren Newton, MD MPH, Director of the NC AHEC Program, Nursing's Role in the Transformation of the Health Care Team, Sylvia T. Brown, EdD, RN, CNE, Dean of the College of Nursing at East Carolina University, Inter-professional Training Innovation in Nursing Education, and Joy Reed, EdD, RN FAAN retired nurse leader from the NC Division of Public Health, Partnering Opportunities in Public Health.

A diverse panel of RIBN students from across the state discussed the challenges and rewards of being involved in this new educational pathway.

BREAKING NEWS: State Board of Community Colleges and UNC Board of Governors Sign Uniform RN-BSN Articulation Agreement

The new Uniform Articulation Agreement between Associate Degree Nursing Programs and the RN to BSN Programs promotes a more seamless, concise pathway for moving from the community colleges to public universities to achieve the BSN degree. Currently there are 11 RN to BSN programs within the University system and 55 NC community colleges offering Associate Degree Nursing programs. This agreement will eliminate differing requirements for transfer from any one specific program to another which has created unnecessary barriers for nurses seeking to continue their education, often resulting in increased time, duplication of courses and added cost to complete their BSN degree.
